## New Program Update: Pangasinan, Philippines

**F**ARMS has served the Christian community in the Philippines for decades. The first FARMS program was started by Joe and Pat Richter in the mountains of northern Luzon. It demonstrated the impact loans for income generating projects can have when biblical faithfulness and stewardship is practiced. Numerous Igorot families were lifted out of poverty using their own talents and ingenuity. This FARMS program also helped spread the Gospel and facilitated in the establishment of several churches in the region through the tithing of project holders.

The success of this first program led to the start of three other programs in the Philippines. Our third

was in the province of Pangasinan. This program is an exciting one for us in a number of ways. It was our first program to be implemented by some of our Philippine program partners. We were so

pleased to see these Filipino leaders travel to Pangasinan to do the training and share the trials and success-



es they had experienced in their own programs. We feel strongly that this indigenous partnership between programs in the Philippines will be a great benefit to all involved.

This program had its start through the interest of **Jesus Is Lord Fellowship** in Tom's River, NJ. Over half of this congregation is ethnic Filipino. They had a sincere desire to help their countrymen. Their seed support and your contributions to the **Judith Duncan Memorial Fund** were combined to initiate this loan program.

We were delighted to have one of our trustees, Gary Wiebe, visit this program recently. Gary and his wife Nancy were visiting their daughter, Charity, who teaches in Manila and graciously spent part of their vacation visiting our program. Following is a brief report of their visit.

Our first stop was with Pastor Raul who has a plastic recycling

project with FARMS. In his small lot, there were bags and piles of all kinds of plastic. Young men were carrying 50 pound bags of shredded plastics on their heads and loading them onto a truck bound for Manila. Pastor Raul showed us how the plastic shredding machine worked, and told us that he paid 12 pesos a kilogram for the raw plastics before processing, then processed it and sold it for 20 pesos per kilo in Manila. In addition to income generated for his family, the project provided jobs for several employees.

We also visited Brother Recindo and his wife who bought a bull for 16,500 pesos last February. They will feed the bull a diet of grass and rice straw over the coming months. They intended to sell it in 18 months, when it weighs about 500 kilograms, for 25,000 pesos. We also had the chance to visit numerous other FARMS's animal and agricultural projects that included rice pro-

duction, chickens, pigs, goats, and cattle. All of these projects showed great potential.

We then visited with Ida who has a very successful bridal shop. She rented wedding gowns and other attire, and also produced tailor made clothes. Ida also ran a “sari - sari” store, which is small-scale convenience store stocked with water, candies, shampoo, laundry soap, cakes, beverages, food, and other necessities. From there we visited a motorized tricycle taxi project.

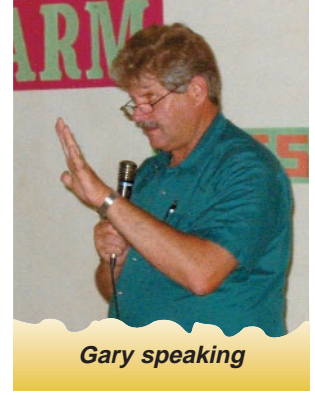
Our hosts also put on an event that brought together all the project holders and the loan committee. I, Gary, was presented with a nice certificate of appreciation that thanked FARMS for our prayers and support. I then had an opportunity to encourage them by expressing the uniqueness of this program and the promise I saw in all of their projects. I encouraged them to continue working hard and to keep “Doing good that is good™.” Our visit to the FARMS projects in Pangasinan was the highlight of our time in the Philippines.

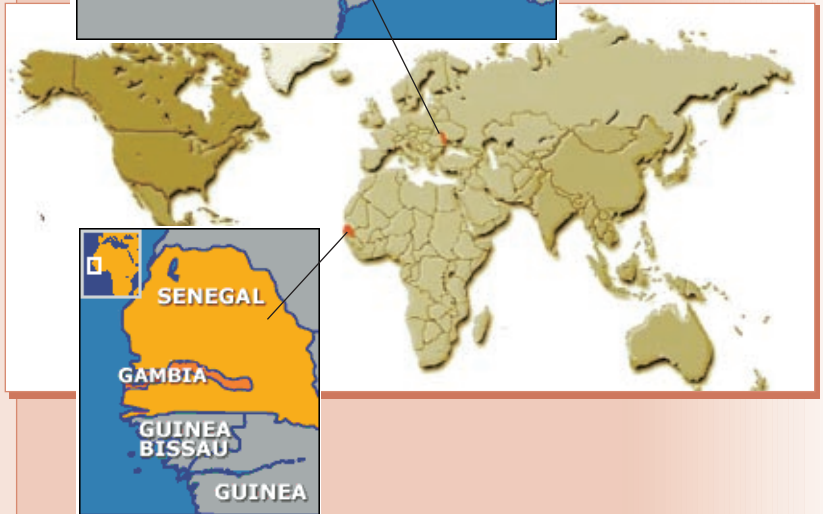
